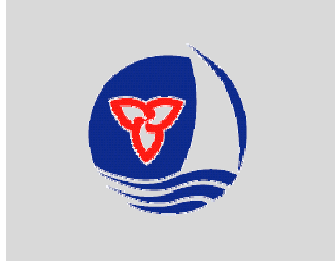
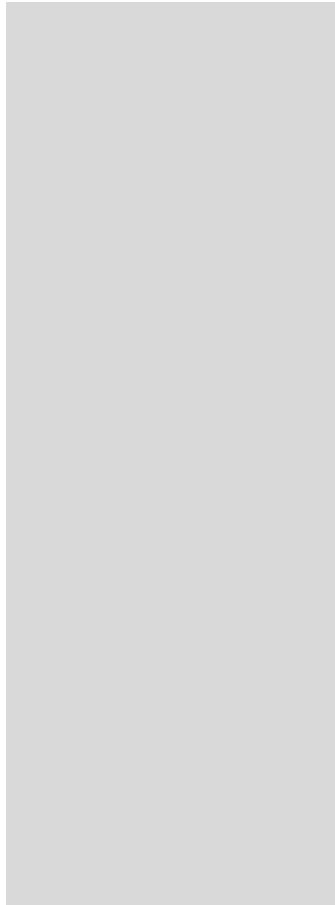

PRESIDENT AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

From Donna Scott, President and Glenn Lethbridge, Executive Director

“Sail under control and remember one hand for yourself and one for the ship”

When traveling through the Great Lakes on non-stop passages, ironically Donna and I both reminded our fellow sailors and students the above motto. It's ironic that many years have passed but we are using the same general rule in managing Ontario Sailing.

“Sail under control” as we move forward in offering services and programs, our Board and staff are constantly running the organization with control, both in person power but also financially. As we move forward our financial stewardship of the past few years will be needed as we anticipate cuts in some of our funding. While we look forward to new challenges it's becoming more important to not rely on Government funding and to continue strong financial control.

Critical to the health of Ontario Sailing will be the continued support of members. It's important to us that all members of clubs continue to be reminded that while they are a member's of a club, they are also members of Ontario Sailing and the CYA. We will be asking members to update their electronic profiles with Ontario Sailing and the CYA in order to help us to continue to represent our member's interests both on and off the water.

While sailing in strong winds, bad weather and at night our fellow sailors were constantly reminded that we need to look after ourselves and don't expect help is just one wave or two ahead. Making wise, well thought out decisions keeps the boat and crew safe.

Ontario Sailing's members, clubs, schools, camps, coaches and race officials are well served by a Board of Directors that operates with this same sense of self-reliance. The board and staff must continue to work on ways to look after ourselves and be even more self-sufficient. As we move forward we will be rolling out more direct services and programs to better serve our membership. Our website www.ontariosailing.ca is a great place to locate many of the new programs and services available to our membership.

Results and Activities

What an amazing year for Ontario sailors 2011 has been! From amazing results in the offshore scene to fantastic local youth regattas to picturesque cruises, Ontario really is the place to be for some wonderful sailing!

Some highlights from the competitive side are:

- Canada's Cup has returned to Canada with a victory by *Vincere*, RCYC
- Great finishes at CYA Youth Champs including, top male and top female finishes in the Laser Radial class and top female in the 420 class.
- Strong showing at the Laser North American Championships with 5 finishing in the top 10 from the Laser class and 2 finishing in the top 10 from the Laser Radial class.
- Alan Liebel (NYC) won the 2.4mR International North American Championship and the 2.4mR US Nationals. Canada swept the podium at the 2.4mR US Nationals.
- A very successful Ontario Sailing Grand Prix Sailing Series with our final champions Sharath Kunath (Laser), Austin Stein (Radial), Owen McNeil (Optimist), Sam Thompson/Jeremy Korb/Billy Fuse (420) & Linor Berezin/ Katherine McEwen (29er)

Fantastic things have also happened this year on & off the water to continue promoting and supporting sailing:

- The BOOM and Access BOOM Mobiles visited 22 different sites across Ontario this summer teaching approximately 350 youth and over 70 adults how to sail.
- Ontario Sailing has continued working with the CYA on benefits of a new Learn to Sail (LTS) system that can be easily transferred at clubs

- We have worked directly with member clubs on Health & Safety Manuals; workshops on governance and volunteerism; and continued to represent our members in organizations such as the Recreational Boating Advisory Council (RBAC)
- As part of the Council of Commodores, Ontario Sailing has continued working on tax assessments issues and other issues that affect our member organizations
- An Ontario Sailing, Sailing School Audit Program was developed, used on a voluntary basis, to help our schools provide the best possible in areas of service, safety and instruction

Ontario Sailing continues to be well served by a strong and dedicated staff, many committees and an Active Board of Directors.

APPEALS COMMITTEE REPORT

The task of the Appeals Committee is to decide appeals submitted by competitors who have been a party to a protest hearing and are dissatisfied with the decision of the Protest Committee. Appeals may only be submitted by parties to the protest hearing and usually claim there was an incorrect interpretation of a rule or conclusion, or a procedural error by the Protest Committee. Some appeals attempt to appeal the facts found which, according to *The Racing Rules of Sailing*, may not be appealed. The Appeals Committee also answers requests for confirmation or correction of a protest committee's decision when it is uncertain it came to the correct decision.

The Appeals Committee decided three matters in 2011 (two appeals and one request for confirmation or correction), down from seven in 2010. According to the rules, there are many decisions an appeals committee may make. It may uphold, change or reverse a protest committee's decision; declare the protest or request for redress invalid; or return the protest or request for the hearing to be reopened, or for a new hearing and decision by the same or a different protest committee; or refuse an appeal. Both appeals resulted in the decisions of the protest committees being upheld. The decision of the protest committee in the request for confirmation or correction was confirmed.

The membership of the Appeals Committee is unchanged from 2010. Ontario Sailing is fortunate to have this excellent group of experienced judges serving on the committee, and they are:

FUNDRAISING and BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Fundraising is the backbone on which Ontario Sailing provides its value back to its membership and stakeholder groups. As with other not-for-profit organizations who provide a valuable service, the more funding available, the more comprehensive the set of services becomes, providing those who benefit from the services the best possible experience. After all, that experience is what we, as members and stakeholders, are all about as we pursue our passion for this sport.

Despite the global economic challenges experienced in 2011, Ontario Sailing has had another very successful year, adding new members, growing our endowment funds, securing critical funding from our government, revamping and enhancing our programs, seeing our athletes perform at increasingly strong levels, and providing some fun along the way through our annual gala and golf tournament.

Two years ago (December 2009), the Hans Fogh Fund was established to support the development of high performance athletes, coaches and officials in Ontario. In two short years, this fund has now grown to more than \$17,000. In 2011, the two major contributors were the Annual Golf Classic contributing nearly \$10,000 and the newly established Coaches Support Challenge contributing \$1,000 to date.

The annual Golf Classic was held on a simply incredible September day at the beautiful Piper's Heath Golf Club. 104 golfers enjoyed bright sunshine, zero humidity, perfect fairways & greens, great food, beverages and prizes. Sponsorship for this event was outstandingly led by our presenting sponsor Velux 5 Oceans. Every hole had a sponsor and beyond that 20 other companies and individuals provided donations to the event. A great time was had by all, and for an outstanding cause.

The Coaches Support Challenge, introduced by Ontario Sailing Executive Director Glenn Lethbridge, provides a very simple and easy approach to raising funds. The Challenge asks individuals to make a pledge to Ontario Sailing of \$100 per year for four consecutive years. Given the size of our membership, if even a fraction will take up the Challenge, a significant amount of funding can be accumulated. For example, if 1,000 members across Ontario pledge, the fund would grow by \$400,000 in the next four years. This can have a significant positive impact on the future of the sport in Ontario. The goal of the Coach Support Challenge is twofold; to support an Ontario Sailing Development Coach as well as fund the Hans Fogh Endowment fund with 50% of each pledge being contributed to the Fund. (The Challenge has raised \$2,000 to date). A contracted Development Coach has already been tasked to work with targeted youth athletes in the development classes & targeted Canada Summer Games athletes for the 2013 Games. As well, the Development Coach is reaching out the non-Olympic classes especially those looking to compete in the 2015 Pan Am Games hosted in Toronto.

In 2010, the Alice Boston Sailing Fund was established in memory of a wonderful life long contributor to the sport of sailing, Alice Boston. Interest earned in this fund, established by the Boston family and Sarnia Yacht Club, can be used to support a broad set of programs. Again, as it grows, there will be an increasing amount of money available to fund initiatives. In 2011, nearly \$7,000 was contributed by individual donors bringing the Fund's total to more than \$21,000.

The above represents a tremendous start to these endowment funds that will make for a bright future of our sport in Ontario. Thank you to all the sponsors, donors and volunteers who are making this possible.

It doesn't stop here. The 2011 annual fundraising dinner & dance, the *Celebration of Sailing Island Gala*, was a tremendous success. This event is the premiere opportunity to kick off the new season by bringing members, athletes, coaches, race officials and sponsors alike, to enjoy an evening of great food, wonderful wines, engaging camaraderie, enticing auctions and legendary recognition. The 157 attendees had an outstanding time, and Ontario Sailing benefited through the results of our major fundraiser. During the event we were pleased to honour the founders of C&C Yachts with the Legends of Ontario Sailing Award.

In 2011 the net proceeds of the Gala were \$26,000. Once again, we thank our presenting sponsor, HKMB | HUB International, and the more than two-dozen corporate and individual donors and volunteers who made this possible.

In addition, 2011 saw the addition of 5 new member clubs/associations. We are happy to have them on board. (Bella Rebecca Community Association, CNIB Lake Joseph Centre, Niagara College Sailing School, SailTime GTA, Wolfe Island Boat Club).

Looking forward, fundraising from the private sector becomes increasingly more important for two reasons. One is simply to grow sources of funds to meet the increasing demands of our programs for each of our key stakeholders. The second is to decrease the reliance upon public funds given both the uncertainty of and the direction of provincial support to sport. Competing for this funding will be more intense, and important, than ever before.

As an OHPSI sport (recognized high-performance sport), Ontario Sailing is recognized as a Top 10 Sport in Ontario. Considering there are 62 recognized sports, this is very positive. Having said that, our expectation is that Provincial funding could drop in 2012 by as much as 12% given their budget and new algorithms by which they measure participants in the sport. Our current understanding would indicate that there would be further formula-based reductions in the next two to three years as well.

In another example, Ontario Sailing is one of 20 proponents for 2012 funding from the Trillium Foundation. These 20 proposals represent \$6.1m in funding requests, and the Foundation has \$1.1 million to provide. We have a strong proposal and trust that we will be awarded our fair share.

For 2012 initiatives, first and foremost will be the Celebration of Sailing Mad Men Gala. This year's event promises to be highly entertaining with its theme based on the successful TV series "Mad Men." In addition, with 2012 being an Olympic year, it will add to the spirit and enthusiasm of the evening. The event is scheduled for March 31st at the Boulevard Club who does such an amazing job of hosting us. As our largest independent fundraiser, we look forward to another outstanding evening! We are currently in the process of securing a Presenting Sponsor for the event as well as other levels of sponsorship. We are excited to be presenting our 3rd Legends of Ontario Sailing Award at the event as well.

We expect the Coaches Support Challenge (discussed above) will have a very positive impact on our fundraising this year. This is all about numbers, gaining commitment from as many people as possible, to participate. We hope that those who take the challenge will then challenge others within their network to sign on as well.

Each year the Toronto International Boat Show holds a Special Preview evening, to which all proceeds are donated to charities and this is back this year after a two year hiatus. We are pleased that Ontario Sailing's Able Sail, Access BOOM Program has once again been selected as one of the recipients.

Based on the success of the Annual Golf Classic, it will continue in 2012 on September 12th and we look forward to another amazing fall day! Work has already begun in securing sponsor and donor commitments.

Additionally, for 2012, we are stepping up our marketing efforts. A component of this addresses Fundraising, but it goes far beyond that, intended to improve communications with all our stakeholders and building and improving upon programs that help their success and enjoyment of the Sport. In the end, we believe these efforts will manifest in gaining increased financial support from private sector sponsors.

In summary, 2011 marked a very successful year for Ontario Sailing fundraising and we thank you all, our members, partners and sponsors for making it possible. 2012 will pose new challenges, and we look forward to your participation and support as we continue to pursue our Vision of making high performance sailing and recreational sailing lifelong activities for boaters in Ontario through excellence in competition and training.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The Board of Directors approved three financial priorities in April 2009 which provide clear direction for the organization over the next few years as well as a framework for measurement. The priorities are outlined below:

1. Investigate new revenue growth outside of traditional government funding, including new user fees, increased membership, and new sponsors;
2. Run a second fundraising event (in addition to Celebration of Sail); and
3. Increase reserves by 5% of budget annually to \$200K in reserves by 2013-2014

The financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2011 reflect continued steady performance against these goals as Ontario Sailing continues its drive towards financial stability. Overall revenues were 7.5% lower than prior year at \$982K, mainly due to lower government funding and the April timing of the 2011 Celebration of Sail which means no Celebration of Sail revenues were recognised in this financial year. Expenses were down by 2.5% resulting in surplus of \$43K compared to \$99K in the prior year; this was ahead of budget and reflects management's continued financial discipline. During the year net cash outflows of \$23K were invested in capital assets in order to strengthen the quality and availability of the underlying asset base used to deliver the broad range of Ontario Sailing programming. Continued focus on disciplined financial management contributed to another year of improvement in the financial strength of Ontario Sailing as reflected on the balance sheet with net assets increasing to \$330K from \$268K in 2010.

Ontario Sailing again received a clean audit opinion on the information presented in the financial statements prepared by management and staff and available on the Ontario Sailing website.

A number of achievements in relation to the priorities outlined above warrant specific mention:

Priority One

- This was the second year of a two year financial commitment by Velux Canada to Ontario Sailing
- Strong support from Boating Business Magazine from their annual golf tournament helped support our Access Boom Mobile program.

Priority Two

- The Hans Fogh Ontario Sailing *Endowment Fund Golf Tournament* raised \$8K and in conjunction with the Alice Boston Fund increased the restricted investments balance to \$52K

Priority Three

- Unrestricted operating reserves increased by \$52K to \$214K which represents approximately 5% of annual revenues
- Reaching more than \$200K in unrestricted reserves reflects achievement of a five year goal in only three years and means that Ontario Sailing continues to drive towards greater financial security; as external funding sources become more uncertain this is increasingly important

The financial performance reflected above is a strong demonstration of the motivation, support and diligence of sponsors, members, volunteers and staff. Together we will continue to drive the long term financial stability and viability of Ontario Sailing.

The BOOM Mobiles had another great year in 2011. This past summer we ran 32 weeks of programming with 8 instructors at 23 sites. This resulted in 421 children, adults and people with a disability participating in one of our BOOM Mobile.

ABLE SAIL REPORT

In 2011 Ontario Sailing ran several programs and initiatives to increase the level of accessible sailing in Ontario. Through these programs, and the use of special equipment, people of all ages and with all types of disabilities were able to experience the sport of sailing.

These initiatives included:

Able Sail Ontario – a provincial collaboration of clubs and programs

Access BOOM – a Mobile Sailing program for people with disabilities

Able Sail Demonstration – weekend and trade show demonstrations of accessible sailing

Program Development – resources to help develop more accessible sailing across Ontario

Boat Loan Program – boats available for loan from programs starting up

Paralympic Training Centres – funded training facilities / services for athlete and coach development

Highlights of 2011:

2011 was another busy year for accessible sailing in Ontario. The Ontario Sailing Access BOOM program traveled to six sites across Ontario and provided sailing opportunities to 65 sailors with a disability. In 2011 we replaced two of our Access 2.3 dinghies for two Access 303 dinghies. The Access Dinghy 303 is a larger boat and allowed us to accommodate a greater variety of sailors on our Access BOOM Mobile. A special thanks goes to the Access BOOM instructors Jenny Banfai and Lauren McCullough for a fantastic summer.

Looking forward to 2012 we will be running a modified version of the Access BOOM Mobile called the Access BOOM Legacy Program. As part of the Access BOOM Legacy Program we will work closely with former Access BOOM sites to help them develop their own sustainable accessible sailing programs.

In August of 2011, Royal Hamilton Yacht Club and Burlington Sailing & Boating Club hosted the Mobility Cup and the 2.4 Meter North American Championships. The 2011 Mobility Cup included both the Martin 16 and the Access Liberty. Participants traveled from across Canada and internationally to compete in the Mobility Cup. Ontario Sailing was able to provide two coaches to run on-land and on-water coaching on the practice day leading up to Mobility Cup. In 2012 Nepean Sailing Club, in Ottawa, will host the Mobility Cup.

In 2011 several accessible sailing programs across the province saw a great deal of growth and continue to expand their programs. In the spring of 2011 we sold our last Martin 16 to BS&BC and the boat was a much needed acquisition to their expanding program.

In 2011 a number of new Learning Facilitators from Ontario were trained at a CYA clinic hosted at Buffalo Canoe Club. Existing Learning Facilitators had an opportunity to participate in professional development training on Fundamental Movement Skills last winter.

Ontario Learn To Cruise Instructors

The overall number of instructors in the province remained stable in calendar 2011. Basic Instructor clinics were held in Ottawa and Toronto in the spring. An Intermediate Instructor clinic was conducted in early spring out of Humber Bay. As the season progressed, some schools experienced difficulty in meeting the demand for instructors, particularly at the Basic Cruising level.

Instructors are certified to teach specific student certification levels. The certification levels for the Cruising and Power instructors in Ontario focus on the Basic (initial and introductory courses) training levels where most of student training occurs.

Eric Cartlidge left Ontario Sailing during 2011, taking a senior position with another sport organization. Our thanks go out to Eric for his efforts and support of the keelboat and powerboat training programs in Ontario. Eric's role was filled by a team effort at Ontario Sailing. Thanks to Megan Medlock, Kathy Chamoun, Shauna Cartlidge and Glenn Lethbridge in making this staffing change relatively painless. We are fortunate to work with such a dedicated and friendly staff.

On the national level, the Training and Certification Committee established a "Cruising Panel" to assist in the maintenance and development of the Learn to Cruise and Learn to Power Standards. In the fall of 2010, RYA Instructor training was conducted on the east and west coast, and a number of cruising instructors were certified to teach RYA student levels. In the fall of 2011, some of the successful instructor candidates from 2010 returned to Halifax and were trained and certified as MCA examiners. Our congratulations to those successful at achieving this certification. At the national level, some effort has been spent looking at the overall direction for the cruising program, and looking at whether closer links to the RYA training system make sense in Canada. Consensus seems to be that a few RYA schools established in Canada in tidal areas will co-exist with schools delivering CYA Cruising and Powerboating training.

In late spring, Transport Canada released two documents defining how schools carrying out training in recreational vessels (less than 24 metres) will be dealt with under the Canada Shipping Act (2001). The Shipping Act defines paying students as passengers, and as such school vessels carrying students that have paid for tuition fall under commercial rules. The purpose of these Transport Canada standards is to provide Learn to Cruise and Learn to Sail (Cansail) schools some exemptions from this requirement when training is being conducted. Without this agreement, a paying student being carried in a coach boat or aboard a keelboat or power boat would make that boat subject to commercial rules. These standards, the result of 12 years of consultation with Transport, are expected to be in force for the 2012 boating season.
